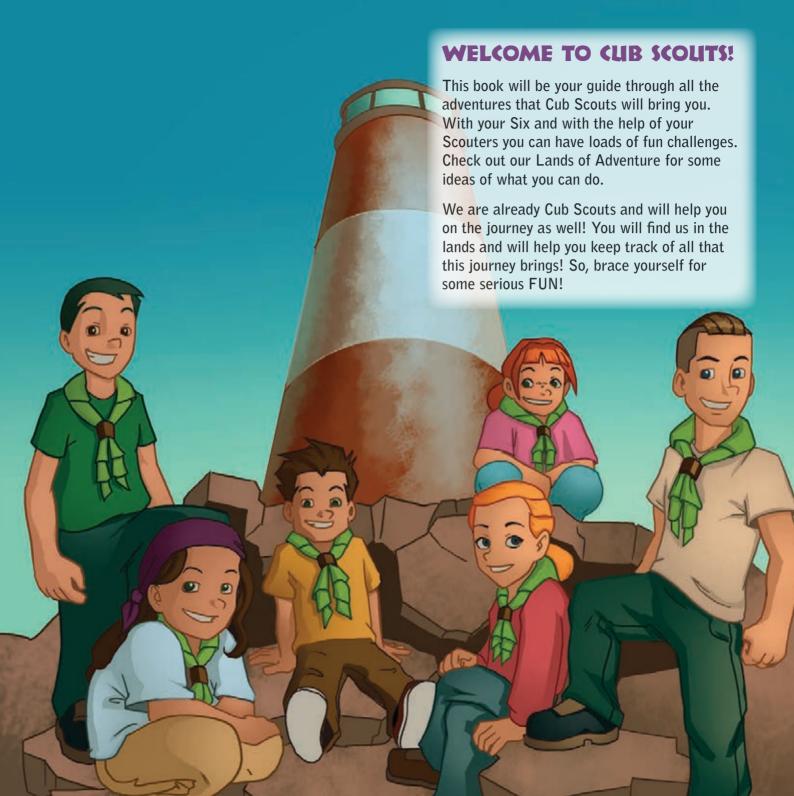

#### HISTORY OF SCOUTING

Scouting was started by Robert Baden Powell who was a soldier in the British Army a century ago. His experiences in the army inspired him to teach boys adventure and life skills while having a lot of fun with their friends.

He wrote "Scouting for Boys" and it started a Movement which swept the world in 1907. He tried out his ideas in a camp on Brownsea Island in England. This was the very first Scout Camp.

Ireland was one of the first countries to have Scouts. Now Scouting Ireland is one of the biggest youth organisations in the country.

Scouts across the world greet each other with a left-handed handshake. This is a sign of trust and friendship. There is a story that when Baden Powell entered the city of Kumasi in Africa, he was greeted by one of the Great Ashanti Chiefs. Baden Powell saluted him and offered his right hand as a sign of friendship. The Ashanti Chief moved his shield from his left hand to join his spear in his right hand, so he could shake hands with Baden Powell. When asked why he shook with his left hand, the Chief said that by offering his left hand, which traditionally holds a shield for protection, he was showing his trust to his new friend. Without the shield he would be open to attack.



THE CUB SCOUT JOURNEY

HOW THE CUB PACK WORKS

My name is Conor and I'm the Sixer of the Atlantic Six. That means I'm the leader of the Six. A Six is a group of six Cub Scouts. I have a helper called a Seconder.

I lead some of our activities. We talk about what we like and hope to do. Then I bring all our ideas to the Sixer Council. This is a meeting of Sixers, Seconders, and a Scouter. We decide on activity ideas and the Council helps me to do a good job as Sixer.

As Sixer I help to teach younger Cub Scouts new skills and take a lead role at Investiture Ceremonies. I try to include everybody in our activities and set a good example.

A Cub Scout Pack is a gathering of all the Sixes. In our pack we named our Sixes after seas; Pacific, Arctic, Caribbean, Indian, Baltic, and China. What is your Six named after?

The Sixer Council is a meeting of the Sixers, Seconders and a Scouter. Together they decide on programme ideas and games and the council helps the Sixer do the best job they can when leading their Six.

#### THE CUB SCOUT PACK FORUM

The Pack Forum is a meeting of everyone in the Cub Scout Pack. It is a chance for us all to say how we think the Pack is doing, and what we'd like to do in the future. We all listen to each other. We all have good ideas.

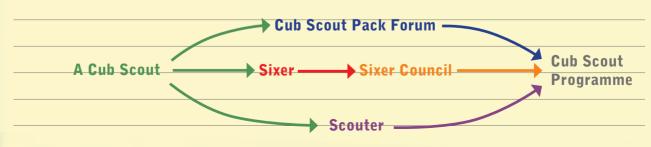
We can decide on a Cub Scout Code for our Pack at the Forum. The Code helps us to have fun in a safe and friendly way. It comes from the Cub Scout Promise and Law.

Every Cub Scout in our Pack needs to understand and accept the Code.

#### AN EXAMPLE OF A CUB SCOUT CODE

#### In this Cub Scout Pack, each member has agreed to:

- 1. Attend all meetings, unless ill or away.
- 2. Listen to and follow the instructions given to them by Scouter, Sixers, and Seconders.
- 3. Attend at least two Scouting events outside the normal Pack weekly meeting.
- 4. Set a good example to other Cub Scouts.
- 5. Wear their uniform with pride. Always be clean!
- 6. Be the best they can be.
- 7. Be respectful and caring.
- 8. Remember to have Fun! How you can have your say



#### THE CUB SCOUT JOURNEY

#### **Planning your Journey**

From the large map of the Lands of Adventure, your Cub Pack picks a land to explore. Your Pack can choose which Land they wish to visit in a number of ways. Ask your Scouter for Ideas.

Once your Pack has chosen the Land of Adventure that you will all visit it's time for you and your Six to decide what activities you would all like to do in the land. Every Cub Scout in the Six must decide what part they will do in the activity.

When you have decided what you are doing you should look to the Travel Cards in the back of your handbook and see which Travel Card you can use.

Now it's time to plan the details and make sure you have enough time. Your Scouter will help with this.

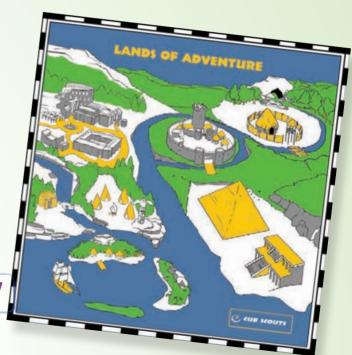
All that's left is to Do what you planned. If you do your best, your Scouter will clip your Travel Card for you.

# DO REVIEW

#### On your Adventure

All that's left is to DO what you have planned! When you are on your adventure remember what you have said you will do and try to achieve this. There are a lot of choices and picking the right choice will make the adventure all the better. Remember you can revisit these Lands as often as you choose.

The best way to do things is to use the Travel Tips. This will be a guide to you about how you should do things and what you should do.



#### Reviewing what you have done

When you get back from your adventure it is good to find out how you did. We always get something out of reviewing what we do. You review what you did with the help of others. The best place to do this is with your Six. Take some time to have a chat about what happened on the adventure and what you got out of it. At the end, see have you done what you said you would do. If you did then you clip the Travel Card.

So, the idea is, when you have collected all of the clips on one side of a Travel Card, your Scouter will give you a bead to put on your toggle. For example; If you have collected all of the clips on one side of your Sarah's Travel Card. You will get your Social SPICES bead to put on your toggle.

When you have collected one SPICES Bead from each SPICES section you can trade your SPICES Beads in for your Personal Journey Badge. So Six different SPICES beads equals a badge



#### The Badges are called:



Turas this means journey



Taisteal this means travel



Tagann this means arrive

#### SPECIAL INTEREST BADGES

As part of your adventure you might explore new areas. We have badges for this too. You can earn a Special Interest Badge in five different areas:

- Personal Skill
- · Physical Recreation
- Adventure Journey
- Community Involvement
- Environment

There is a list of ideas for badges under each heading; your Scouter will have this list. But you should also try to come up with your own! Special Interest badges take into account your personal interests and hobbies. They allow you to increase your skill or to acquire a new skill. As a Cub Scout you can earn up to three badges from each area of Special Interest.

#### **Special Interest Badges should:**

- 1. Encourage and challenge you to learn new skills or develop new skills.
- 2. Increase your knowledge in particular areas.
- 3. Contain practical elements which will benefit you and others.
- 4. How you earn your badge is unique to you as a Cub Scout. You write out your challenge with the help of your Mentor (older Scout/parent/other Scouters).
- 5. Remember you earn the badge by doing your best.

#### **Getting started**

Go to your Scouter, they will help you to decide which area to choose and how to get going. They'll help you to write down what you're going to do and how it fits in with the other badges you're doing.

You will agree on a mentor with your Scouter who will guide and encourage you.

## Here are some questions that you should ask yourself when you are planning your Special Interest Badge:

What Special Interest Area will I choose?

- What am I going to do?
- What steps do I need to take to do this?
- How long will it take me?
- · Where will I do it?
- Do I need any equipment or adult help?
- How will I know that I have achieved what I set out to do?

Check your plan as you're doing your Special Interest Badge, to see that you're doing what you set out to do. Change the plan if you need to. Make sure you have given yourself enough time to finish it.

#### **CHIEF SCOUT AWARD**

In your last year in Cub Scouts you can do the Chief Scout Award. This is a very special award given by our Chief Scout and you have to do seven projects to get the badge. To earn the badge you really have to do your best and when finished will be able to wear it on your Scout Uniform.

Before you start your badge you have to ask your Scouter to download the form from the Website www.scouts.ie. Together with your Scouter, plan what you would like to do. Remember to keep a record of your progress.

The following are the projects you have to do:

**Skill**: One Special Interest Badge from the "Skill" Area

**Physical**: One Special Interest Badge from the "Physical" Area

**Community**: One Special Interest Badge from the "Community" Area

**Environment**: One Special Interest Badge from the "Environment" Area

**Scout Skill**: Two Adventure Skills to Stage two and two Adventure Skills to Stage four

**Expedition**: Walking 20 Km over an eight hour day

**Residential / Intercultural:** Shared activity with a group in a residential/camp setting for three days & two nights, must include an intercultural aspect

As you can see there is plenty that you can to do and it will take you a lot of time. You will get help from your Scouters, the Pack and your Six while doing your projects. Other Cub Scouts are doing their badge as well.

When you complete your Chief Scout's Award there will be great celebrations!



#### **ADVENTURE SKILLS**

To enjoy your adventure you will need new skills. As you learn these skills you can earn one of the nine Adventure Skills Badges. If you were in Beaver Scouts, you may already have some. If so, move onto the next stage!

If you have just joined Cub Scouts, choose

the Adventure Skill that you would like to learn and get started! Check out your Adventure Skills Poster Book for all the details.

#### THE NINE ADVENTURE SKILLS ARE:



**Backwoods**: Learn how to live without electricity, running water, and the comforts of home. Work with nature to survive!



**Camping**: Find out how to pitch different types of tents. Learn how to find a good campsite, and what gear you need to bring along.



Emergencies: When things go wrong, it's good to know how to help. Learning First Aid and other skills to help people is vital for any Cub Scout.



Hill walking: Be prepared for hiking everywhere outdoors. Learn how to plan your route, avoid getting lost, using a map and compass, and what to wear and carry.



**Paddling:** This is perfect for the water-lovers. Get the basics of water safety under your belt. Find out how to use and care for Paddling gear.



**Air Activities**: This is about things that fly! Learn how planes, kites, and hot-air balloons work. How does the wind affect things that fly?



**Rowing**: It's not as easy as it looks! Get to the bottom of this skill and get moving on the water.



**Pioneering:** Learn some knots and lashings and use them to design and build your own camp gadgets!



**Sailing:** Learn about navigation, water safety, ropework, storage and use of the boats, and vital teamwork. Then get on the water with your Pack!

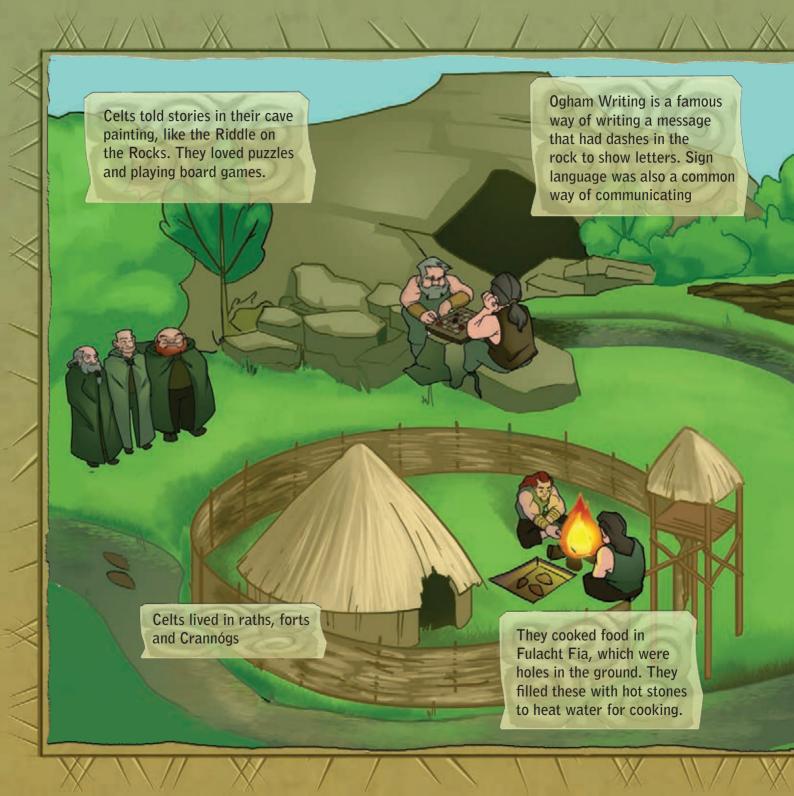

The Celts look like they enjoyed celebrations like Samhain. Can we have a Bonfire party like them?

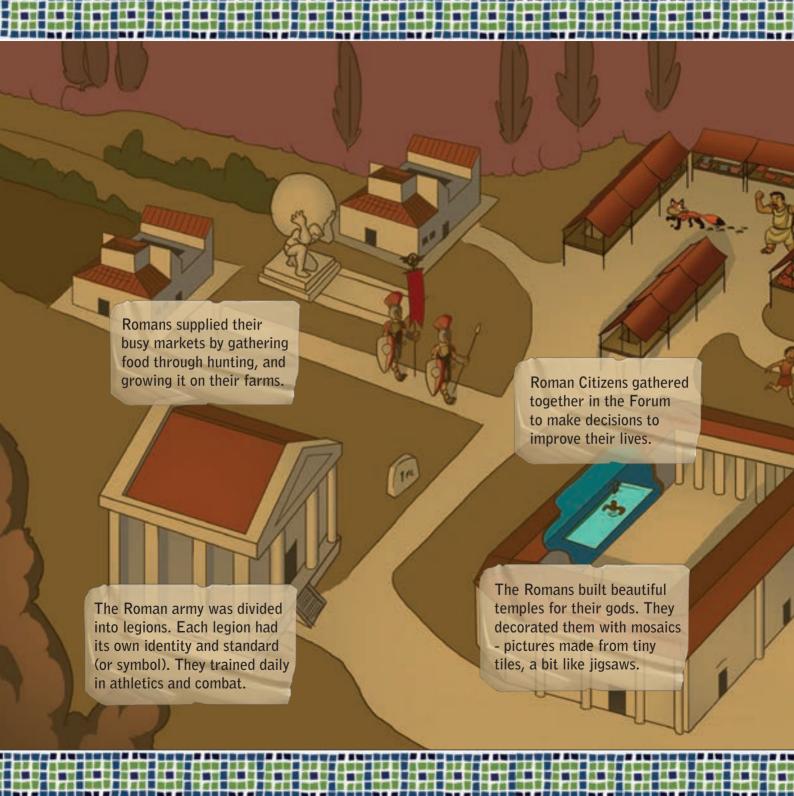

Here are our notes from our journey, they may help you!



Look at the countryside IN-> around you to see if you can spot any landmarks such as roads, rivers or forests.

Using the key, see if you can find these on the map.

Turn the map around until the places on the map line up with the real features you can see. You should be able work out exactly where you are.

Tip: The symbols on the map give you a picture of what is in the area that you are looking at! Look at a landmark. Imagine a WHERE I WANT straight line running from the centre TO GET TO OF the compass to the landmark.

Adjust the dial of the compass so that the "N" mark on the dial lines up with the coloured tip of the needle.

Hold the compass level and flat.

Keep it away from any metal objects, such as cameras. These may distort the magnetic field around the compass and so spoil the reading.

Allow time for the needle to settle. The coloured end will swing towards north.

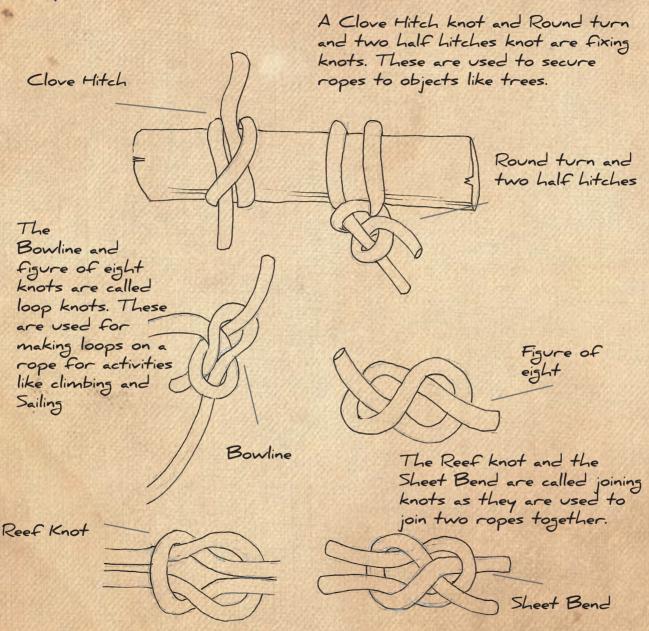

On the compass, look at the point where your imaginary line crosses the dial. The number of degrees shown on the dial at this point is your bearing.

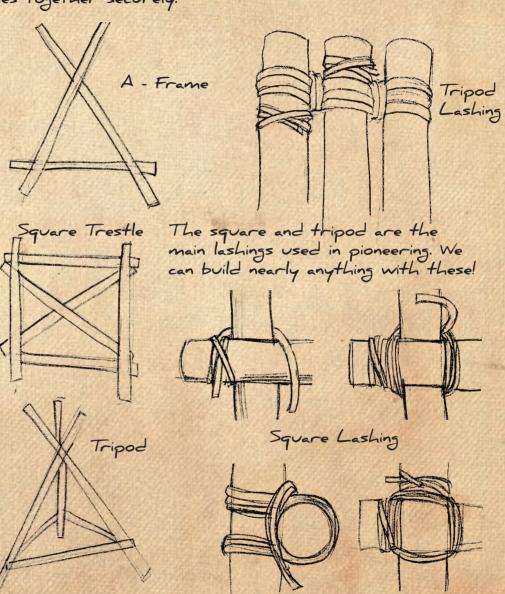

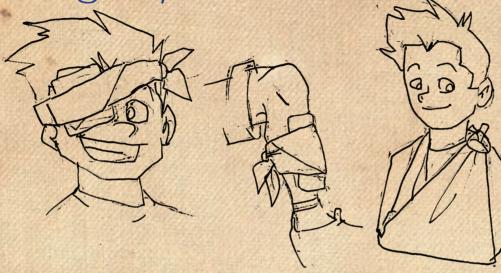


Lashings are knots which use a combination of knots and wrapping to create a binding which holds

All pioneering structures are made using a number of simple forms - The A frame, square trestle and the tripod. These are stable and if made properly will not move out of shape. 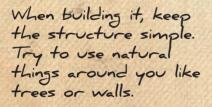
Hypothermia is when you get dangerously cold. To prevent this happening wear layers of warm clothes and change them if they get wet. Shivering is a sign that you are getting cold.

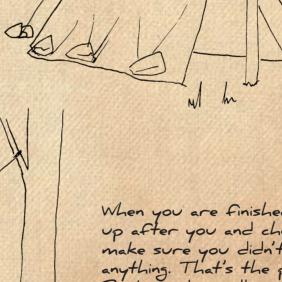
### Backwoods

Bivvy shelters are easy to make. The main thing that comes in handy is a bivry sheet. You can get this in any hardware shop. It's like a tarpauline sheet.

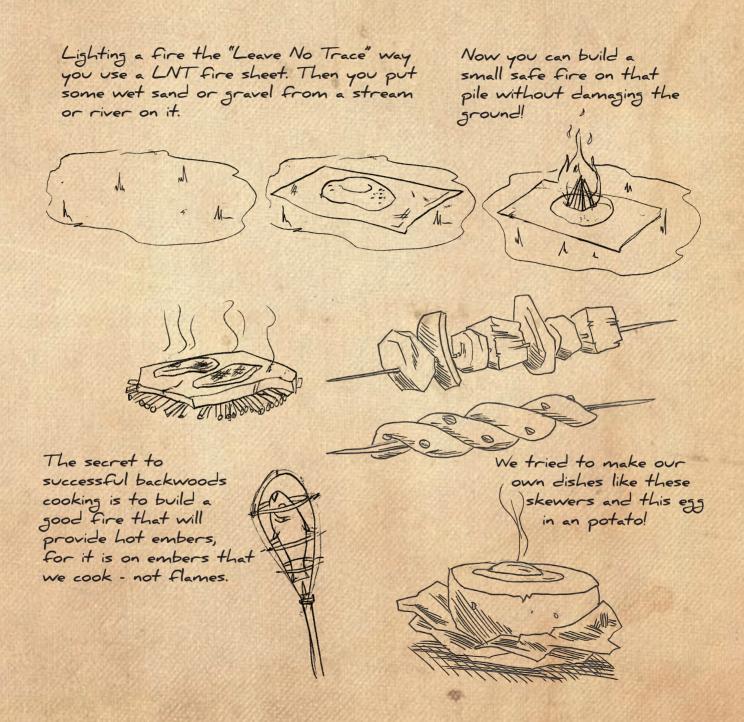
When building the shelter make sure not to break trees or other plants!



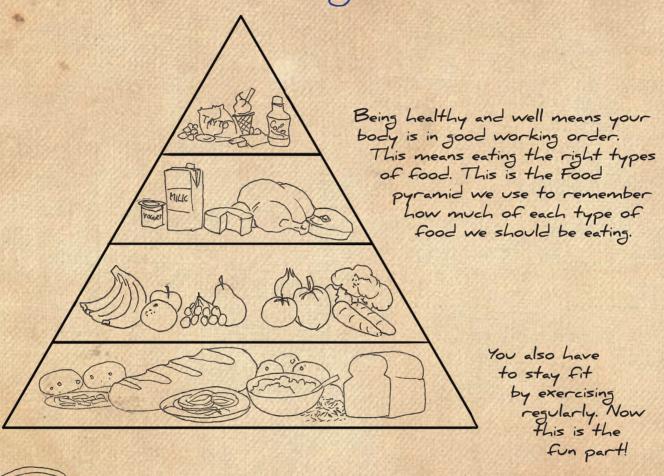


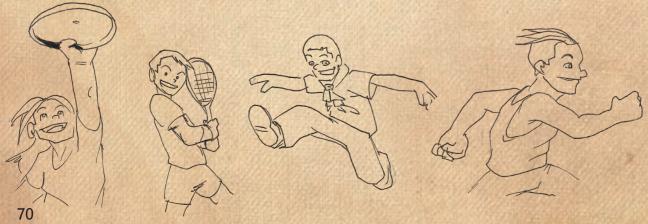


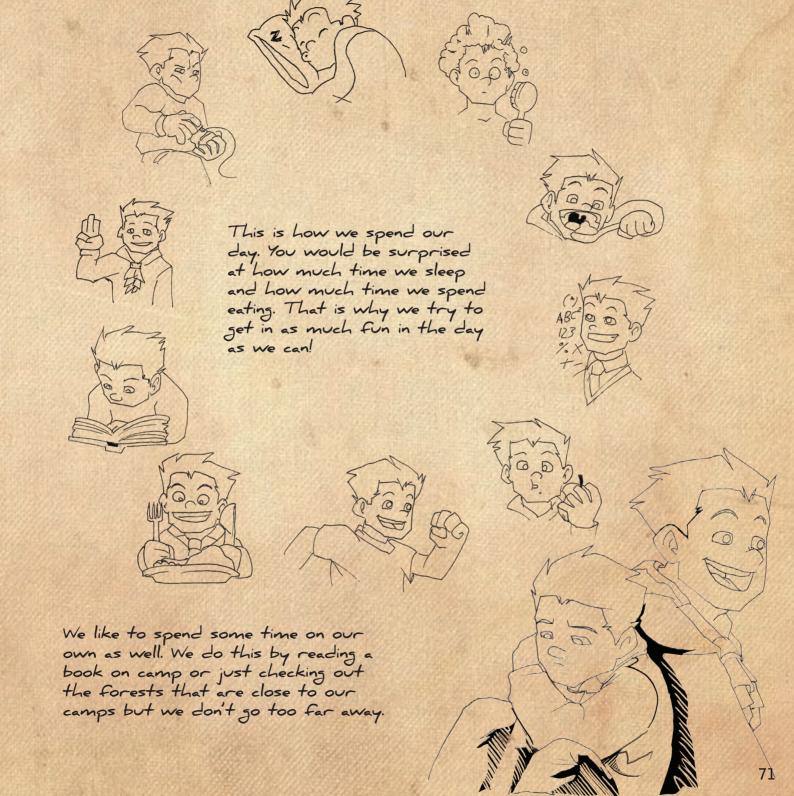
